COMMITMENT TO CARE AND COMPASSION



In life, we have or will experience the unfolding of care and compassion as a response usually to suffering. Have you ever wondered why it unfolds in some situations or settings but not in others, especially as these values are core virtues for any community that we belong to? Would you describe yourself as a consistently caring and compassionate person? Let us hope that you are, maybe not at all times, but, hopefully, most of the time. It is believed that, as a society, we are the most compassionate when we are well-rested and not in a hurry, or, when we are around certain people in our lives to which we are closest. This is a great start and an encouraging beginning.

As a society, we all need to move towards raising our conscience to orient our thoughts more consistently towards the feelings and needs of others and not just ourselves. This starting point exists within us all and, as a country, we often learn about matters that are brought to our attention by what we see in the media or experience on a local, national, or global level. We have an awareness of how to recognise suffering. This recognition will always start the process of feeling compassion for others, especially when what we see is based on aspects of division and hardships; we all have the instinct to help others, and this is wonderful. However, if the truth be told, there are times when it can be mentally challenging for us to turn our thoughts and efforts towards others. It is almost as if to be caring and compassionate we first need to know what effort is required because, at times, we have a weaker compassionate response, a weakened response to strangers, a weakened response to matters of mass suffering or, dare we say it, even a weakened response to our loved ones.

When dealing with matters requiring a compassionate response, we must become more consistent with our approach. Typically, when we see suffering in many different forms, we feel emotionally moved and wish there be a relief. As a society, we need to have a readiness to take action at ALL times. We must consistently take on the virtues of care and compassion with a mass effort. Interestingly, many people have likened compassion to be like a muscle that, like any other, can be strengthened with relevant exercises or can deteriorate. In other words, our capacity for compassion can expand, if we choose to work on it. So, as we step into the summer season and aim to get fit for all that we hope to do and begin to embark on new exercise routines, let us pick up the weight of care and compassion – it is amazing what it can do for our bodies and everybody.



EASTER SERVICE

At the end of every term, St Michael's celebrates together in a whole school service. At Easter, we invited the students to consider the story of Easter and posed the question, 'believe it or not?'.

The story of Jesus' crucifixion and death is a harsh reality of how the Romans dealt with whom they presumed to be guilty of a serious crime. Although the Roman governor Pilate could not find any evidence to put Jesus to death, he bowed to public pressure and ordered his execution. However, unlike any other crucifixion, Jesus's life didn't end on that cross. He rose again 3 days later from the dead, proving he was whom he said he was – The son of God.

Our service used dance, song, drama, music and spoken word to illustrate the story of Easter.




PROTEST ART WORKSHOP
