Winner of Pearson Silver National Teaching Award for Secondary School of the Year: Making a Difference



On 21st June 2023, the staff of St Michael's Church of England High School were selected from thousands of nominations to win a Pearson National Teaching Silver Award for Making a Difference - Secondary School, for their outstanding commitment to changing the lives of the children they work with every day.

St Michael's Church of England High School has now been shortlisted to win one of just 16 Gold Awards, which will be announced and celebrated at a gala ceremony in London on 25th November and televised on the BBC, with winners showcased on The One Show.

The award was announced on National Thank a Teacher Day, an annual event celebrating the role of educators across the UK for the valued role they play in communities and shaping young people.



Mrs Handy-Rivett, Headteacher, says: "I am extremely proud of Student Voice and the plethora of student-led initiatives in school. I am elated that our student-centred approach to making a difference for the community has been recognised through receiving this prestigious award".



Goldsmiths' Community Engagement Awards

The students prepared and delivered an exceptional showcase to demonstrate commitment to supporting our school and wider community. Sadly, we did not win, however, our students were recognised for making it to the final 8 out of almost 180 schools across the country. Our Year 7 boys were the youngest representatives that day, but they held their own against other Year 13 students, speaking eloquently and confidently about projects.






Bell Ringing

Library

Speaking Volumes Funding for Library Books

The *Speaking Volumes* charity was formed by Cecil Jackson-Cole, an entrepreneur with a passion for making a difference to those who were suffering. Cecil was the cofounder of Oxfam and had opened shops in Oxford such as Age UK; he preferred to stay out of the public eye. When he sadly lost his wife, he couldn't find any books to support the grief process so created a small charity to ensure Christian literature is accessible to everyone; after his death, and over time, part of this has evolved into *Speaking Volumes*. Speaking volumes ensure they "offer grants for books to many diverse places such as prisons, schools, care homes, hospices, churches, community centres, plus many places abroad, ensuring that whenever someone needs comfort, hope or inspiration there's a book that can help them in their moment of need".

In April we submitted a bid for funding and were granted £300 to spend on books for the school library. We are pleased that these are now available in the library for staff and students to loan. A sample of the books purchased with the grant are below.

Libre soft

In May, the Library transferred their Library Management system over from The Reading Cloud to Libresoft. The reason for the migration was to update our Library catalogue and provide the school with a more up-to-date interface that is user friendly and accessible to all. In the near future, we are hoping to be able to provide students with their own unique log-in details so they can access Libresoft and browse the catalogue, giving students 24/7 access to the school library. We are also hoping to integrate an eBook platform into the system enabling students to borrow and read books online any place, any time which would take over from our previously used eBook platform, SORA.

Events


