





As part of this, the subject leaders of modern foreign languages, history, and geography shared information about their course content, and how this is assessed at the end of Key Stage 4.

Local college information stalls were set up in the dining hall with staff on hand to offer advice on the courses they offer, and their entry requirements. Parents/carers were also able to speak with subject leaders to find out more about each of the courses that we offer at St Michael's.

On Thursday the 29th of February, we will be holding our Year 9 Parents' Evening. This is an opportunity for parents/carers to meet with all of their child's subject teachers to discuss the progress they are currently



making. They will also be able to ask further questions about the courses their child would like to choose.


A VERY SPECIAL LETTER
