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How do we live out our Christian vision?

This term we have been focusing on our school's Christian Vision Statement and encouraging students to consider how they can live out the vision in their everyday lives. Each week, students have listened to a short message from our School Chaplain, Reverend Bridge, sharing a thought on each of the three aspects of the vision and how they can be applied. Throughout the half-term, students have been able to reflect during their year group collective worship times and think about the 'windows' in terms of the ways they can view life through different perspectives, the 'mirrors' that is how they can think about each aspect of the vision within their own personal journey, and the 'doors' in terms of the opportunities they have in school to use their initiatives and creativity to showcase and outlive the school vision in different ways.

In school, we recognise that developing the spirituality of our students and adults is a fundamental aspect of enabling students and adults to flourish. Our school's distinctively Christian vision encapsulates a sense of connection to something bigger than ourselves, and it involves a search for meaning in life. As such, our school vision encompasses spirituality as a universal human experience something that touches us all. As a Church of England school, we follow the teachings of Christ, and the ethos of the school is at the heart of our teaching and learning. The vision encourages the whole school community to be engaged on a journey of discovery throughout their time with us.

Spiritual development differs from person to person and is a very personal experience. For this reason, it is difficult to put into words. Spirituality is not the same as having a religion or faith; a person can be spiritual without having a particular faith. For Christians in church, spirituality is about developing a deeper understanding of and connection with God. It is about God's way of being with us and our way of being with God. Through this, we are able to respond to the loving nature of God as revealed through the Trinity: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. A school is not a church, but it is a collection of people who come from a variety of backgrounds for the purpose of education. Family backgrounds may be very different and spiritual development must take account of the varied circumstances of staff and students.

Therefore, in light of this and in light of our school's distinctively Christian vision, at St Michael's, we define spirituality as what connects our relationships with us, our family, friends, and our community to God and to all of creation.

The penultimate week of this half-term is our 'Inter-faith' week, and we are taking the opportunity to focus on our school value of equality. We have planned a range of activities for students to celebrate the collective faiths of students and staff, as well as those with no faith. We are a school that believes in inclusivity and equality, and that every individual in school will have their own journey of spirituality, asking the Big Questions in life and being able to really live their lives to the full.

The final thought I would like to leave you with is on the back of our recent visit to school by HRH Prince William. I want to honour the hard work behind the scenes of every member of staff involved in preparation for his visit, and to really highlight and celebrate the amazing students, in particularly, Freddie Hadley who did themselves and the school proud upon Prince William's visit to the school. The visit reminded me of a story in John 12 v 12, where Jesus enters Jerusalem riding



on a donkey. For hundreds of years the Jews had been excitedly awaiting to arrival of the Messiah. They believed he would be the person to come and rescue them from the oppression of the Romans and save their people. However, Jesus came, not as a glorious warrior on a horse riding with an army to come to the rescue, but as a humble king entering into the city on a mere donkey. We saw similar traits of humility in Prince William throughout his visit, and students and staff commented on how 'down to earth' he was and even cracking a 'dad joke' when asked for one, when he met the members of the Matrix Project. Humility is one of our school values and so I would like to end this thought by encouraging each one of us to consider opportunities where we can demonstrate the value of humility and put others needs above our own.



RE VISIT TO SHREWSBURY PRISON



On the 11th of April, Mr Bending and Mrs Westwood took twelve students from Year 9 to the "Lead your ship" graduation day at Alexander Stadium in Birmingham. This event was attended by nine other schools from across the West Midlands. The students had completed a 12-week intervention designed to equip young people with the tools needed to navigate safely in today's youth culture. The program combines street cricket with workshops that address daily challenges young people face, such as gang affiliation and joint enterprise.

The graduation day featured a quick cricket tournament in which St Michael's competed against Q3 Academy and Ormiston Shelfield Community Academy. Although we did not advance to the semi-finals, the students played exceptionally well and were competitive against worthy opponents.

Well done to both teams, you really were a credit to the school, demonstrating the school values throughout the day.


